Our Focus on Advanced Abdominal Cancers

We are committed to saving lives and improving quality of life by connecting patients, survivors, and caregivers to the information and support that they need in their fight against abdominal cancers, including rare and advanced gastrointestinal and gynecologic malignancies. We are patients and survivors, caregivers and families, clinicians, and organizations - all working together to shift the paradigms keeping so many from reaching the care they need in time. By raising awareness with the public and clinicians, making connections to resources and care, and guiding patient and caregiver navigation throughout the cancer journey, we aim to see that every patient reaches the care they need.



About Abdominal Cancers

Abdominal cancers refers to malignancies that originate in numerous organs in the abdomen and often spread throughout the abdominal cavity, or the peritoneum. Also referred to as peritoneal carcinomatosis or as peritoneal metastases, it is the spread of cancer in the abdominal cavity that may or may not involve solid organs such as the liver, spleen, and lymph nodes. That spread of cancer is caused by peritoneal surface malignancies, which can originate from a wide variety or tumors, including origins in the appendix, colon, rectum, stomach, ovaries, uterus, and peritoneum, among others.

2024: An Incredible Year of Building

2024 was a year of building tremendous momentum and growth. We began the year by vision casting with our Board of Directors and developing a focused strategic plan of work. We identified critical needs of patients and caregivers and deepened our ties with partner organizations and top medical professionals in the field. Our awareness efforts took a major leap forward with the launch of a new website and strengthening our social media presence with campaigns to educate and engage. We refined our operational foundation by implementing deeper accounting and financial analysis, including revising the depth of our operating budget. We improved our development strategies by growing our donor base, strengthening our fundraising activities, and cultivating new partners. These enhancements allow us to steward our resources more effectively, make data-informed decisions, and operate with greater transparency and efficiency. Most importantly, these successes allow us to scale our activities and sustain our momentum as we grow forward.

a message from our president

In 2024, we enjoyed great success rolling out the Abdominal Cancers Alliance and we are very excited about that work supporting those facing rare and advanced gastrointestinal and gynecologic cancers. But 2024 also included the successful completion of our breast and cervical cancers program in Cali, Colombia!

Our work in Colombia began as an NGO initiative to improve medical care in Cali, and I am so proud that our program has been fully institutionalized in the local government health infrastructure to sustain the care facilities, staffing, equipment, and expertise necessary to deliver high-quality care. And as we celebrate this major milestone and continue our business of bridging the gap in cancer care, we turn our attention to another area of need that is near and dear to so many in our community: serving patients, caregivers, and families facing rare and advanced abdominal cancers.

Our journey started in the early 2000s when set out to improve medical access in Cali. By the 2010s, we had organized medical missions that provided over 35,000 free medical visits and 3,000 surgical procedures. Recognizing the urgent need for sustainable cancer care, PFCCAP was incorporated in 2011. Since then, we've transformed the model for breast and cervical cancer care in Cali. We implemented a patient navigation system, partnered with organizations like American Breast Care and Soul Ryeders to provide essential product donations, and hosted hundreds of patient support activities that focus on addressing the emotional, social, and economic realities of facing cancer.

In 2017, we worked with our governmental partners at Red de Salud del Norte, a leading health facility in Colombia, to establish a community-based clinic to provide consistent and sustainable local care. Over the years, this clinic has made it possible to provide more than 2,300 biopsies, 52,000 mammograms, and 30,000 breast ultrasounds.







Our education efforts drastically improved early detection, reducing inconclusive mammograms and cutting diagnostic wait times from 98 to just 9 days. Today, 93% of detected breast cancers are in early stages—an incredible reversal from when we started. Additionally, our cervical cancer prevention initiative has successfully vaccinated 88% of participating students against HPV.









In the fight against cancer, there are many gaps in the care provided to cancer patients, caregivers, and their families. We set out to bridge a gap in cancer care for women facing breast and cervical cancer in Cali, Colombia. PFCCAP is proud to have helped close that gap.











As we complete one successful project, we redouble our attention on another gap faced by patients and caregivers facing abdominal cancers with the creation of the Abdominal Cancers Alliance. a message from our executive director

The Abdominal Cancers Alliance was created by patients, caregivers, and clinicians who have lived the reality of dealing with abdominal cancers: patients who fought for the right treatment, caregivers who stood by their loved ones, and clinicians who witnessed the gaps in care. Our experiences navigating these overwhelming challenges of misdiagnosis, lack of up-to-date information, limited access to treatment, and insufficient support systems inspired us to build a better path for others. As an appendix cancer survivor and CRS/HIPEC patient myself, I know first-hand the fear, frustration, and uncertainty that come with these diagnoses.

Our journeys navigating these rare and advanced abdominal cancers are at the heart of everything that we do. By combining our personal experiences with the insights of a passionate network of supporters and advocates, we approached this work with a deep appreciation of the challenges we're up against as a community facing these cancers:

Inadequate Direction to Treatment

Patients are dying due to misinformation and a lack of awareness about abdominal cancer diagnoses and treatment options. Every day patients are being improperly diagnosed and treated, leading to unnecessary deaths and lowering the quality of life for many.





Lack of Coordination Across the Community


A diverse network of patients and caregivers want to help and be engaged, but need to be equipped and directed. Many who were lucky to find the right path to treatment and the right care providers want to help others on that journey, rather than leave their survival to chance.

Inadequate Support on the Journey

Patients' and caregivers' needs for support throughout the cancer journey are greater than what they receive from their care teams and immediate support systems.



It was with this foundation of understanding and connection to this community that we cast a vision for what a better future for our fellow patients and caregivers could look like. We are committed to raising awareness, creating connections, and guiding navigation for patients and caregivers throughout their cancer journey.



Awareness

We are raising awareness to shift the paradigm of misdiagnosis and treatment of rare and advanced abdominal cancers such that more patients and caregivers find the right path to treatment and the right providers earlier in their journey.

Navigation

We are empowering patients and caregivers across their journey, from detection and diagnosis through treatment and survivorship.

Through all of this work, we will improve quality and length of life for those facing rare and advanced abdominal cancers by amplifying the best available resources and empowering a diverse network of patients, caregivers, clinicians, and organizations.

Recognizing the importance of investing in systems to support our community, we strengthened our team with new additions to our board of directors including Keera Godfrey Ed.D., Julie Mercer, and Dan McNamara. 





Library of Resources

A key piece of helping patients and caregivers understand their diagnosis is providing educational resources, all produced and vetted by medical professionals alongside patients and caregivers who have already gone through treatment. Our online library of resources is free and available to anyone seeking to understand their cancer and what to do about it, and includes information about abdominal cancer diagnoses, treatment options like the CRS/HIPEC procedure, a glossary of terminology, and frequently asked questions.

What is Cytoreductive Surgery & HIPEC?







Finding a high-quality care provider is critical

How long have you been performing HIPEC? How many procedures have you done / do you perform annually?

- Your outcomes after surgery are directly related to your surgeon's ability to safely remove all of the tumors.
- This requires extensive experience to make safe decisions and have the best chances of achieving complete cytoreduction.
- Some studies have shown that CRS/HIPEC requires a long learning curve, necessitating surgeons to perform over 100 procedures to be considered experts.

Lorne Johnson, Canada

In 2021, Lorne Johnson was diagnosed with a **rare appendiceal cancer** after noticing a small hernia. Doctors in his home country of Canada deemed him ineligible for CRS/HIPEC and projected a three-year life expectancy. Inspired by stories of other patients fighting similar rare cancers, he sought a second opinion and found the care he needed in the United States. **4 years later**, Lorne is enjoying life in his "Bonus Round," and is an advocate for others to seek multiple opinions.

Helen Szablya, California

In 2009, Helen was diagnosed with **stage IV primary peritoneal cancer** and underwent a 10-hour cytoreductive surgery with hyperthermic intraperitoneal chemotherapy (CRS/HIPEC). Through a challenging recovery and a series of chemotherapy treatments, today Helen is a **15-year cancer survivor** and living her life to the fullest!

Paul Kalusa, Virginia

In 2022, Paul was diagnosed with **stage IV colon cancer** shortly after the birth of his daughter and was given only a few months to live. Determined to fight, Paul underwent aggressive chemotherapy and, thanks to his wife Irene's research, would later undergo CRS/HIPEC. **3 years later**, Paul is cancer-free, raising his daughter, and performing again. In 2023, Paul closed out our Talent Show, helping to build awareness and demonstrate hope.

Patient and Caregiver Network

The Patient and Caregiver Network connects individuals facing cancer with one-on-one human support systems. The Network connects patients and caregivers with others who have walked in their shoes to support them throughout the patient journey. We launched this pilot program in 2024 and were proud to have already made more than 50 connections between patients, caregivers, and volunteers eager to support others on their cancer journey.

Remembering Dr. John Singer

2024 marked not only exciting milestones for Partners for Cancer Care and Prevention - the year also included the passing of our longtime colleague, dear friend, and Co-founder, Dr. John Singer.

Dr. John Singer and his wife Ruth founded PFCCAP alongside Dr. Armando Sardi in 2011, building on years of successful medical missions to Colombia. Since its inception, John was deeply involved in the organization and its surgical services in Colombia and ensuring exceptional standards of care for underresourced and under-served communities. In his career leading up to his leadership with PFCCAP, John served as the head of the surgical residency program at Saint Agnes Hospital in Baltimore for nearly thirty years. John was an accomplished writer and editor of a national academic surgery journal, and an experienced leader of his peers with a six-year tenure as the governor of the Maryland Chapter of the American College of Surgeons. Dr. Singer's career as a physician specializing in surgery, oncology, and endocrinology, and a life-long commitment to education and mentorship, spanned nearly sixty years.

Dr. Armando Sardi, Co-Founder and President of Partners for Cancer Care and Prevention, said, "It is with great sadness that I announce the passing of our friend and fellow Board Member, John Singer. John was a co-founder and leader in our work for nearly twenty years and we are thankful for his outstanding leadership, friendship, guidance and wisdom. He will be greatly missed by the PFCCAP family, the cancer care community, and the many, many lives he touched over so many years."

When John was asked why he is so tireless in his dedication to serving others, he stated: "I feel that it is very important for the more fortunate to give back, to leave the planet better than we found it." John was always an outstanding example of this and it was a driving force that led to the creation of PFCCAP. With Dr. Singer's leadership in service to patients in Colombia, PFCCAP achieved great things, including: providing direct medical services to thousands of patients, performing thousands of surgical procedures, conducting hundreds of patient navigation and support events and activities, and developing a remarkable model for breast cancer care difficult to come by even in the United States.

We ask you to join us in remembering John Singer as we honor his life and career of love and compassion. We celebrate his love of food and art and appreciating the beauty all around us. We cherish his sharp wit and (often unfiltered!) humor. And we carry forward his deeply held belief in the importance of service to others and the enduring value of community.

May we all embody John's spirit of love without borders.
